PREPOSITIONS (PRÄPOSITIONEN)

Präpositionen sind eine Klasse von Wörtern, die eine zeitliche, räumliche oder logische Beziehung zwischen den Wörtern eines Satzes herstellen. Oft stehen sie auch vor Hauptworten.

Beispiele:

The book is **on** the table.

Das Buch ist **auf** dem Tisch

The book is **beside** the table.

Das Buch ist **neben** dem Tisch.

She read the book during class. Sie las das Buch während des Unterrichts.

In den drei obengenannten Beispielen wird das Hauptwort "book" durch die jeweilige Präposition in eine räumliche bzw. zeitliche Beziehung zum Rest des Satzes gesetzt.

Man unterscheidet zwischen einfachen Präpositionen (simple prepositions) und zusammengesetzten Präpositionen (compound prepositions).

Beispiele simple prepositions:

The cat ran after the dog.

The bird flew against the window.

Beispiele compound prepositions:

This book is in between "Eragon" and "The Lord of the Rings".

The car is in front of the house.

Im Englischen gibt es rund 150 Präpositionen. Viele davon haben mehrfache, unterschiedliche Bedeutungen. Es empfiehlt sich daher für die genaue Bedeutung und den Gebrauch einer Präposition in einem Wörterbuch nachzuschlagen.

Es folgt eine Übersicht über die wichtigsten Präpositionen und deren Bedeutungen/Verwendungen.
